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SUBJECT: 2017-18 ADOPTED BUDGET and LCAP – APPROVAL

The County Superintendent of Schools is required to review and approve the district's Local Control and Accountability Plan or the annual update to an existing Local Control and Accountability Plan prior to the approval of the district's Adopted Budget [Education Code Section 42127(d)(2)].

Adopted Local Control and Accountability Plan

In accordance with California Education Code (EC) Section 52070, our office has completed its review of the district's 2017-18 Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) to determine whether it adheres to the guidelines adopted by the State Board of Education (SBE).

The district's adopted LCAP has been analyzed to determine whether:

- The plan adheres to the template adopted by the State Board of Education;
- The budget includes sufficient expenditures to implement the actions and strategies included in the plan, based on the projected costs included in the plan; and
- The plan adheres to the expenditure requirements for funds apportioned on the basis of the number and concentration of unduplicated pupils.

The district's adopted LCAP has been analyzed in the context of the guidance provided by the California County Superintendents Educational Services Association (CCSESA) and the California Department of Education (CDE). Based on our analysis, the district's Local Control and Accountability Plan for the 2017-18 fiscal year has been approved by the Riverside County Superintendent of Schools. Our goal is to further enhance the performance of students by providing feedback and inquiry questions that will support your refinement of the 2017-18 Local Control and Accountability Plan to close the achievement gap in metrics that impact student preparedness for college and career.

Student Achievement

The purpose of the LCAP is to ensure that all students graduate from high school with the skills needed to be successful in both college and career. Riverside County Office of Education conducted a review of research on K-12 college readiness indicators to identify those that would align with the LCAP purpose and have greatest impact. As a result of this research, we recommend that local educational agencies closely monitor the metrics listed in the data table below for all student groups.

We offer the following commendations and inquiry questions to consider for the implementation of the 2017-18 Local Control and Accountability Plan and the refinement of the plan in the years 2018-19 and 2019-20.

Standards Met or Exceeded in ELA and Mathematics

The district is to be commended for looking closely at the data and using it extensively to guide its program decisions. Actions and programs chosen to meet the goals are research-based and aligned to the needs identified by the data. In spite of budget concerns referenced in the plan in several places, services are being supported to the degree possible. The district offered a wide array of college-ready courses (e.g., International Baccalaureate [IB], Advancement Via Individual Determination [AVID], Advanced Placement [AP]) with increased enrollment, and expanded the CTE pathways. Additional dialogue related to the questions below may support the achievement of the expected annual measurable outcomes and goals aligned to student achievement in ELA and mathematics:

- How might identification of factors that contributed to the general decline in achievement across student groups this year impact future pupil achievement metrics?
- How might the district address the needs of student groups recognized in the *Plan Summary* as "greatest in need" beyond support programs currently being implemented?
- How might you review the expected annual measurable objectives to achieve a more accelerated rate of growth in student achievement?

Course Access and Student Enrollment in Rigorous Coursework and CTE Pathways

The district is to be commended for completing the three-course sequence for CTE pathways and the increase in CTE participation. The district is also to be commended for decreasing the dropout rate and the rate of students failing two or more classes in all student groups. Additional dialogue related to the questions below may support the achievement of the expected annual measurable outcomes and goals aligned to course access and student enrollment in rigorous coursework and CTE pathways:

- For groups who experienced a decline in graduation rate, what would it look like if interventions were differentiated for the unique needs of each student group?
- How might you accelerate progress toward meeting district and state targets for the reduction of the dropout rate and the rate of students failing two or more classes?

Pupil Engagement and School Climate

The district is to be commended for employing a strategic approach to seeking the perspectives of parents, staff, and students and using those perspectives to develop clear goals and actions. Periodic reviews of progress related to interventions and actions kept pupil engagement and school climate a priority. The district Teacher Induction Program provided a great opportunity to develop teachers who are effective in building student engagement and an equitable school climate. Additional dialogue related to the question below may support the achievement of the expected annual measurable outcomes and goals aligned to pupil engagement and school climate:

 How might identification of barriers to improved attendance, reduced chronic absenteeism, zero period participation, and inter/intramural participation rates impact pupil engagement metrics?

Monitoring Progress

It is recommended that the district utilize a process that continually assesses the progress of each planned action and its effectiveness in achieving the expected annual measurable outcomes related to each goal specified in the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP). Identifying leading indicators for progress on goals and developing a system to monitor those indicators throughout the year is encouraged. The information received from progress monitoring can support communication with

stakeholders and provide information the district will need to clearly articulate, in the *Annual Update* section of the plan, the effectiveness of the planned actions/services.

Fiscal Recommendations

Supplemental and Concentration grant funding is included in the Local Control Funding Formula to increase and/or improve services to targeted student populations. If supplemental and concentration grant funds have been underinvested each fiscal year, it may be difficult for the district to demonstrate compliance with the LCFF spending regulations at full implementation.

During our review of the district's LCAP, we noted the following:

Certain estimated actual expenditures identified in the Annual Update did not have a
corresponding dollar amount or source. We recommended that all estimated actual
expenditures include dollar amounts, even if zero, and a source. The district implemented our
recommendation.

Adopted Budget

In accordance with California Education Code (EC) Section 42127, our office has completed its review of the district's 2017-18 Adopted Budget to determine whether it complies with the criteria and standards adopted by the (SBE) and whether it allows the district to meet its financial obligations for the 2017-18 fiscal year, as well as satisfy its multi-year financial commitments.

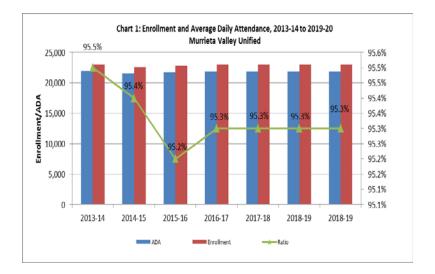
Based on our analysis of the information submitted, we <u>approve</u> the district's budget, but note the following concerns:

- Operating Deficit Multi-year financial projections indicate a substantial General Fund operating deficit for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.
- Flat Enrollment The district's projections indicate flat enrollment for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.

Assumptions and Other Considerations

The district's Adopted Budget was developed prior to adoption of the 2017-18 Adopted State Budget. Actual state budget data should be reviewed and incorporated into the district operating budget and multi-year projections during the First Interim Reporting process.

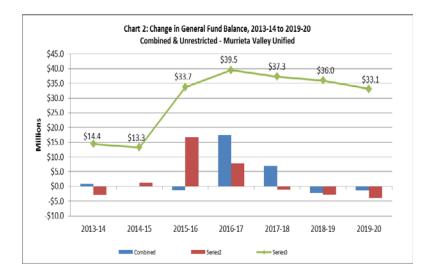
Enrollment and Average Daily Attendance (ADA) – The district's projected ADA to enrollment ratio (capture rate) for 2017-18 is 95.3 percent, which is within the historical average ratio for the three prior fiscal years. The district estimates 21,883 ADA for the current fiscal year, or no change from the 2016-17 P-2 ADA. For 2018-19 and 2019-20, the district projects ADA to remain flat.



Unduplicated Pupil Percentage – The district reports an unduplicated pupil percentage of 32.76 percent for 2017-18, 32.15 percent for 2018-19, and 32.15 percent for 2019-20. The district's unduplicated pupil percentage included in the 2016-17 P-2 certification by the California Department of Education is 33.31 percent.

LCFF Gap Funding – For purposes of determining the potential gap funding increase, the district has estimated 43.97 percent for the 2017-18 fiscal year, 71.53 percent for 2018-19, and 73.51 percent for 2019-20. The district has assigned funds each year in the unrestricted ending General Fund balance that will cover a portion of the projected gap funding increase should it not materialize.

Fund Balance – The district's Adopted Budget indicates a positive ending balance for all funds in the 2017-18 fiscal year. However, for the General Fund, the district anticipates expenditures and uses will exceed revenues and sources by \$2.2 million in 2017-18, \$1.3 million in 2018-19, and \$2.8 million in 2019-20. Chart 2 shows the district's deficit spending historical trends and projections.

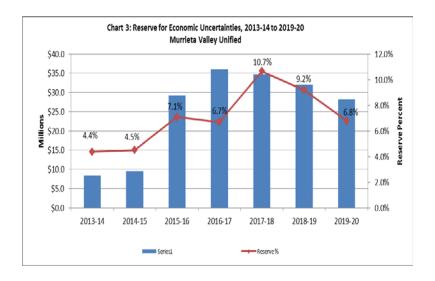


Employee Negotiations – As of the board date, June 22, 2017, the district reports salary and benefit negotiations continue with both the certificated and classified bargaining units for the 2017-18 fiscal

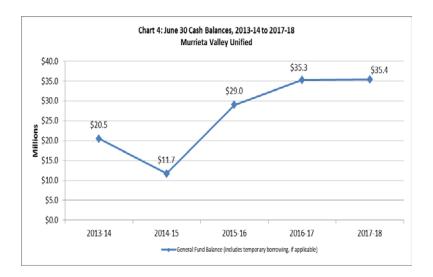

year. Prior to entering into a written agreement, California Government Code (GC) Section 3547.5 requires a public school employer to publicly disclose the major provisions of a collective bargaining agreement, including but not limited to, the costs incurred in the current and subsequent fiscal years. The disclosure must include a written certification signed by the district superintendent and chief business official that the district can meet the costs incurred by the district during the term of the agreement. Therefore, please make available to the public and submit a disclosure to our office at least ten (10) working days prior to the date on which the governing board is to take action on a proposed agreement.

Reserve for Economic Uncertainties – The minimum state-required reserve for a district of Murrieta Valley Unified's size is 3.0 percent. Chart 3 displays a summary of the district's actual and projected unrestricted General Fund balance and reserves. The district projects to meet the minimum reserve requirement in the current and two subsequent fiscal years.

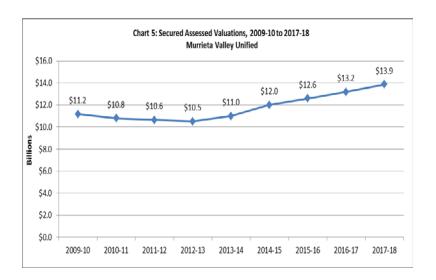


Cash Management – Chart 4 provides a historical summary of the district's June 30th General Fund cash balance. Based on the budget's cash flow analysis, the district projects a positive General Fund cash balance of \$35.4 million as of June 30, 2018. This balance does not include any temporary borrowings, and the district's internal cash resources appear sufficient to address cash flow needs in the current year. Our office recommends the district continue to closely monitor cash in all funds to ensure sufficient resources are available. In addition, our office strongly advises districts to consult with legal counsel and independent auditors prior to using Cafeteria Special Revenue Fund (Fund 13) and Building Fund (Fund 21) for temporary interfund borrowing purposes to remedy cash shortfalls.



AB 2756 – Current law, as enacted through AB 2756 (Chapter 52, Statutes of 2004), requires the County Superintendent to review and consider any studies, reports, evaluations, or audits that may contain evidence a district is showing fiscal distress. Our office did not receive any such reports for the district.

Assessed Valuations – The Riverside County Assessor's Office has estimated secured assessed valuations will increase by 5.53 percent countywide in 2017-18. Chart 5 displays a historical summary of the district's secured property tax assessed valuations.



Conclusion

As the State rapidly approaches full implementation of the LCFF, it is vital that districts exercise sound fiscal judgement and remain cognizant of the rapidly changing environment in which we currently operate. Districts should maintain cautious regard when planning future programs and preparing multi-year financial projections.
