SUBJECT: 2023-24 LCAP and ADOPTED BUDGET - APPROVAL

The County Superintendent of Schools is required to review and approve the district's Local Control and Accountability Plan or the annual update to an existing Local Control and Accountability Plan prior to the approval of the district's Adopted Budget [Education Code Section 42127(d)(2)].

Adopted Local Control and Accountability Plan

In accordance with California Education Code (EC) Section 52070, our office has completed its review of the district's 2023-24 Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) to determine whether it adheres to the guidelines adopted by the State Board of Education (SBE).

The district's adopted LCAP has been analyzed to determine whether:

- The plan adheres to the template adopted by the State Board of Education.
- The budget includes sufficient expenditures to implement the actions and strategies included in the plan, based on the projected costs included in the plan.
- The plan adheres to the expenditure requirements for funds apportioned on the basis of the number and concentration of unduplicated pupils.
- The plan includes the calculations to determine whether there is required carryover. If applicable, the plan includes a description of the planned uses of the specified funds and a description of how the planned uses of those funds satisfy the requirements for specific actions to be considered as contributing toward meeting the increased or improved services requirement.

The district's adopted LCAP has been analyzed in the context of the guidance provided by the California County Superintendents and the California Department of

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Education (CDE). Based on our analysis, the district's Local Control and Accountability Plan for the 2023-24 fiscal year has been **approved** by the Riverside County Superintendent of Schools. Our goal is to further enhance the performance of students by providing feedback and inquiry questions that will support the refinement of future Local Control and Accountability Plans and any additional plans designed to close the achievement gap in metrics that impact student preparedness for college and career.

Student Achievement

The purpose of the LCAP is to ensure that all students graduate from high school with the skills necessary to be successful in both college and career. The Riverside County Office of Education conducted a review of research on TK-12 college readiness indicators to identify those that would align with the LCAP purpose and have the greatest impact. As a result of this research, we recommend that local education agencies (LEAs) closely monitor the metrics listed in the data table below for all student groups.

We offer the following commendations and inquiry questions to consider for the implementation of the 2023-24 Local Control and Accountability Plan and the refinement of the plan in future years.

Student Success in Academics

The district is to be commended for ranking number 1 in Riverside County for students earning the Golden State Seal Merit Diploma by demonstrating the mastery of the curriculum in at least six academic subject areas.

Additional dialogue related to the questions below may support achievement of the goals and desired outcomes aligned to student academic achievement:

- What shifts in existing LCAP resources and actions might be considered to maximize efforts to close achievement gaps for underperforming student groups?
- How might the district leverage the additional LCAP-funded staff positions to promote student academic progress and social-emotional learning in a targeted manner which differentiates based on student needs?

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- How might the district take identified high-leverage best practices and routines to scale across all grade levels to address learner variability, especially for underperforming (marginalized) student groups?
- How might the district monitor and ensure rigorous, best first instruction across all disciplines in order to accelerate achievement and promote engagement for English Learner and Students with Disabilities student groups?

Student Access, Enrollment, and Success in Rigorous Coursework

The district is to be commended on achieving the highest A-G completion rate in Riverside County and continuing to be above both the county and state averages for college-going rates. In addition, the district continues to lead Riverside County in the area of Advanced Placement (AP) enrollment, examinations taken, and the number of students earning an examination score of 3 or better. Lastly, the district is to be recognized for increases in Career Technical Education (CTE) enrollment and pathway completion especially within the student groups of American Indian and Hispanic.

Additional dialogue related to the questions below may support achievement of the goals and desired outcomes aligned to student access, enrollment, and success in rigorous coursework:

- How might the efficacy of district professional development efforts be measured to identify the strategies which are most effective and scale them out to build teacher capacity to improve student learning and specifically close the achievement gap?
- Many districts are using one-time money to build systems of support around student needs. As fiscal resources recede in the coming years, what strategies might the district employ to maintain effective educator professional development in the areas of both academic intervention and access to high-rigor courses?
- As the district identifies and expands the highest leverage instructional strategies for student enrollment, access, and success in programs such as: AP, International Baccalaureate (IB), Dual Enrollment, and Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID), how will the district continue to grow these programs?

Student Engagement and School Climate

The district is to be commended for the exceptional work to improve the physical, environmental, and social aspects of school which have a profound impact on student experiences, attitudes, behaviors, and performance. The district has met its identified targets in the areas of decreasing suspensions/expulsions and dropout rates, while increasing the district's graduation rate. The most recent Panorama family survey response indicates that the district maintains safe educational environments for all.

Additional dialogue related to the questions below may support achievement of the goals and desired outcomes aligned to student engagement and school climate:

• The social and emotional learning needs of students has increased exponentially post pandemic. Simultaneously, educators are reporting high levels of personal and

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professional stress. How might efforts to improve student engagement and school climate be leveraged or extended to improve staff social and emotional wellbeing to strengthen teacher-student relationships as a high-impact component of improving student learning outcomes?

- Given the additional specialists, counselors, interventionists, etc., how might LCAP
 actions and resources help identify the root causes to target differentiated support and
 resources for specific student groups most in need with regards to chronic absenteeism?
- How might the district explore and measure the impact of professional development efforts to increase high-quality instruction as it relates to improving student engagement and attendance?

Adopted Budget

The district's Adopted Budget was developed in the context of the Governor's 2023-24 May Revise. Subsequently, the 2023-24 State Budget was adopted, which contained differences from the May Revise. The district should update and revise its budget projections to reflect changes in available funding.

Based on our analysis of the information submitted, and our assessment of revenue changes in the enacted State Budget, we **approve** the district's budget, but would like to highlight the following:

Enrollment and Average Daily Attendance (ADA) – The district estimates 24,838 ADA for the current fiscal year, or a 1.0 percent increase from the certified 2022-23 P-2 ADA. For 2024-25, the district projects a 0.7 percent increase in ADA. For 2025-26, the district projects a 0.1 percent decrease in ADA. It will be important for the district to monitor enrollment in the current and subsequent years to ensure accurate LCFF revenue and plan accordingly.

Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) – The district's Adopted Budget included Cost-of-Living Adjustments (COLAs) for LCFF funding of 8.22 percent, 3.94 percent, and 3.29 percent for the 2023-24, 2024-25, and 2025-26 fiscal years, respectively. Our office recommends a contingency plan should LCFF funding not materialize as projected in the 2023-24 State Budget.

Unrestricted Deficit Spending – The district's Adopted Budget indicates a positive ending balance for all funds in the 2023-24 fiscal year. However, for the unrestricted General Fund, the district anticipates expenditures and uses will exceed revenues and sources by \$3.0 million in 2023-24.

Employee Negotiations – As of the board date, June 27, 2023, the district reports salary and benefit negotiations continue with both the certificated and classified bargaining units for the 2023-24 fiscal year. Prior to entering into a written agreement, California Government Code

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(GC) Section 3547.5 requires a public school employer to publicly disclose the major provisions of a collective bargaining agreement, including but not limited to, the costs incurred in the current and subsequent fiscal years. The disclosure must include a written certification signed by the district superintendent and chief business official that the district can meet the costs incurred by the district during the term of the agreement. Therefore, please make available to the public and submit a disclosure to our office at least ten (10) working days prior to the date on which the governing board is to take action on a proposed agreement.

Reserve for Economic Uncertainties —The minimum state-required reserve for a district of Temecula Valley Unified School District's size is 3.0 percent; however the governing board requires the district maintain a 6.0 percent reserve for economic uncertainties. In light of the current fiscal environment, our office recommends districts maintain reserves higher than the minimum and commends the district's board for this fiscally prudent practice. The district projects to meet the minimum-reserve requirement, and board-required reserve, in the current and two subsequent fiscal years. Additionally, existing law imposes a 10 percent cap on the amount school districts can maintain in their reserves in fiscal years immediately succeeding those in which the Public School System Stabilization Account balance is at least 3 percent of TK-12 Prop. 98 funding. This condition was met with the 2022-23 deposit amount, triggering the local reserve cap for the 2023-24 fiscal year. The district projects to meet the imposed 10 percent reserve cap.

Cash Management – Attention to cash solvency remains a critical fiscal practice and should continue to be prioritized in the coming year. The district projects sufficient cash balances to cover projected expenditures during the 2023-24 fiscal year. Should the district identify the need for temporary borrowing options, our office strongly advises districts to consult with legal counsel and independent auditors prior to using Cafeteria Special Revenue Fund (Fund 13) and Building Fund (Fund 21) for temporary interfund borrowing purposes to remedy cash shortfalls.

AB 2756 – Current law, as enacted through AB 2756 (Chapter 52, Statutes of 2004), requires the County Superintendent to review and consider any studies, reports, evaluations, or audits that may contain evidence a district is showing fiscal distress. Our office did not receive any such reports for the district.
